

PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Parishioners:

Last Sunday evening (March 26) we experienced a fierce storm with heavy rain, high winds, thunder, lightning, and a tornado warning. The wind and rain lashed against my windows as thunder rumbled and shook the house, and warning sirens blared. My dog, Mabel, who does not like storms, was staying very close to me as I watched the weather radar on T.V. The weatherman who was interpreting the radar also mentioned that people in the warning area should take cover. This time of the year, when we as Christians are preparing for Easter, is also the time to be prepared for severe weather. I can still remember the "Palm Sunday Tornado" of 1965 (I was 9 years old), which swept across several states causing much destruction, and loss of life. There was damage and destruction in and around my hometown of Ada as well. I was also remembering how we always lit a blessed candle and put it in a central place, whenever severe storms threatened. It was a practice we learned from my grandmother. The lighted blessed candle is a sign of our prayer for God's protection, and for our own safety. When the thunder boomed, my grandmother would also say (in German) "Lieber Herr Gott schelt," which means, "the loving God is scolding." So the thunder also prompted a quick examination of conscience and an act of contrition as we considered why God is scolding.

Although the ability to give advance warning of severe weather is vastly greater today than when I was young, still, the weather is not something we humans can control. So when severe weather threatens, we must heed warnings, take the necessary precautions, and among all of the practical things we do, we must also remember to pray.



GOD'S VISION CAN BE SCARY –

Realizing God's vision for humanity is not an easy thing. We see in the Garden of Gethsemane that God enters deeply into human suffering, that not even Christ

himself can avoid this all-too-prevalent part of the human experience. Indeed, we see in the garden – and perhaps we recognize in our own lives – that God is at work through suffering, that we must enter into those dark moments in order to bring to fruition God's great dreams for us and for others.

As we look out at our world, perhaps we, too, carry on our lips that prayer of Jesus in the Garden, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me; still, not my will but yours be done." That's an honest and intense encounter with God, a God who asks that we live the Gospel call to mercy, justice and love no matter the cost.

But we also know that the story did not end in the Garden. It didn't end on the cross, It didn't even end in the tomb. Rather, God makes all things new, emerging victorious in even the darkest of hours. When Bad Things Happen

John 11:1-45

In today’s Gospel a friend of Jesus is dying, and Jesus purposely waits before going to him in Bethany. By the time Jesus arrives, Lazarus has died, and his two sisters are distraught. If Jesus had come at once, he could have healed their brother!


Both women profess their faith in Jesus as Lord and their belief that they will be reunited with their brother in eternity, but they are grieving deeply. The painful question that hangs in the balance is: Why did Jesus allow this bad thing to happen to Lazarus? Jesus answers this question earlier in the passage when he said this was all part of a plan to reveal God’s glory.

The story of Lazarus is a precursor to what will happen next week when God allows Jesus to die on the cross and then raises Jesus from the dead. What seems to be a





The word “bereaved” has roots meaning “to be torn apart.” When someone dies, bereaved people experience a deep emotional wound. It is no surprise that comforting the sorrowful is a work of mercy. One of the best ways to comfort someone who is grieving is to listen. Don’t try to change the way the person is feeling. Just listen. And while you are listening, pray for the person who is grieving.
